

Greetings fellow Ripples Readers.

Like the weather that was changing the week of Thanksgiving, so is the TEC program. As we experience transition in our diocese, many of our churches, and even in the universal Church, there is no surprise that we are experiencing a transition with TEC. For many years we have been graced by Fr. Denny Labat leading our program at the helm. With his help and the help of so many of you, our Lord has touched hundreds and thousands of lives with His Spirit. And for these last couple of years, I have been blessed to be a part of the spiritual leadership of TEC. As the Spiritual Director, not only did I have some huge shoes to fill with Fr. Denny, but I was also fortunate to have him help me wear those shoes. Fr. Andy Michels (our Assistant Spiritual Director) was also a blessing to work with as we together carried out the spiritual component of the program. Despite all the help of these two wonderful priests, our previous coordinators, our new ones, I needed to step away from the Spiritual Direction position.

I have been blessed with six parishes that I have been pastor of and a school. Although one of them, St. John in Morton closed this past June 30th, the plan for three of the five parishes is to merge or close by June 30, 2020. Because of my busy schedule currently and going into the future planning, I have chosen to step down. I already got off of the College of Consultors, Priest Council, Diocesan Pastoral Council, and Committee on Parishes. Now, don't get me wrong, it was a blessing to be on these councils and committees, including the TEC Council, but I need to make sure I am available for my flock.

Speaking of flock, my hope is that the TEC program continues to be used as a program that offers an opportunity for our Lord's flock to experience an encounter with Him. So often I think we worry or work at trying to get people to come back and work

TEC and feel that the success of TEC is based on those that return for reunions and/or work the next one(s). However, that should never be the purpose of TEC. The TEC weekend should be about giving people, both the TECites and the team members, an opportunity to encounter our Lord, a weekend to grow in love of Him and His Church, and the desire to go forth and serve Him. As I mentioned earlier, hundreds and thousands have come through the program. The success of TEC is not about returners, it is about how the fire of faith has been passed on and continues to grow - take for example the number of priests and religious that came out of the program, the number of directors of religious education and catechists and teachers, the numbers of faith-filled parents, husbands and wives and single people. That is where the success of TEC lies... in the Church. Therefore, as we move forward, let's pray for the success of TEC, not the numbers who attend or return, but the how the Spirit is working in us all. Together, like a field of wheat, we will endure anything - while in Christ, welcoming everything!

Riverbend TEC Enrichment Day: A Fourth & Forth Day of Learning and Growth



On October 5, a cold, dreary Saturday, the Riverbend TEC family gathered at St. Aloysius in Olivia, MN for a day of faith, hope, love, growth, and prayer.

Joining our Riverbend TEC family for the day was: Billy O'Regan, the TEC Conference Executive Director, who traveled from New Orleans, LA, and Deacon Kevin Fuller, the TEC Conference Assistant Director, who traveled from Omaha, NE.

In the morning, we prayed and engaged in table discussion, a format anyone who has made a weekend will recognize! We reflected on the TEC weekend and what makes it such an amazing experience, including friends, family, unconditional love, the opportunity to share God's love with others, and an encounter with Christ. We shared how the experience of dying, rising, and going forth has helped us all grow in faith.

As we prayed together, and each person shared what TEC meant to us, we began to detect a thread emerging from our prayers and discussion. We discovered what most TEC family members know instinctively but may not have ever said out loud before: what makes a TEC center successful is people's ability to connect with other TEC family members. That happens at each Reunion. But... if a TEC center has not had a weekend for a while, people miss their friends and fellow TEC family members.

What keeps a TEC center active, alive, engaged and going is an active Fourth Day.

After lunch, we moved into a more formalized presentation by Billy and Kevin breaking down the format of a TEC weekend event by event. WHAT should we be doing? WHO should be doing it? WHERE should this piece of the weekend take place—the church or the conference room? WHY do we do what we do? HOW do all these pieces fit together to give the TECite the experience we all hope they have?

Even those of us who have multiple weekends worth of service to TEC hopefully found at least a nugget or two of wisdom, especially under the guidance of Billy and Kevin, with their robust theological and Catholic youth service backgrounds.

As we love to do on a TEC weekend, we completed the day by attending mass at St. Aloysius. First, we got fed by Christ in the Eucharist. And then we were fed in another, literal way as we sat down to eat supper at Max's Grill before heading home, pleasantly tired and richly rewarded.

A Reflection on Being a Leader By: Brett Mathiowetz

Throughout our lives, we get exposed to lots of different groups, whether it be family, friends, classes, associations, companies...you get the point. We end up in these groups for many reasons, but much of it boils down to a simple desire that we all share: to belong. We want to feel accepted and loved. Once we join these groups, we learn about each other and the gifts that each person has. We look for ways to contribute using our own gifts—to feel like we are a greater part of this community. Based on gifts, some are called to take on different roles within a community. I most often receive the call to lead.

I made TEC at the age of 16. I was picked on almost mercilessly as a child. I had a very small group of friends, and life always seemed like it had it out for me. Since my parents were leaders in our local TEC community, making a TEC weekend was a huge uplift for me. I met an amazing group of people who helped me discover the real me. I grew tremendously in three days and discovered not only a healthier relationship with myself, but also with God and the Holy Trinity. This was something deeply personal and incredibly healing. I came back a changed person. It was a beautiful experience.

As I spent more times on weekends, I discovered all the things I could offer the people around me. I then helped them see the gifts they had to offer as well. It was the epitome of paying-it-forward. We were building each other up into the people that we were called to be. Then, I heard a call...

Our Diocesan Director of Youth Ministry at the time invited me to a leadership camp. I said yes. Shortly after, an invitation to attend a Diocesan Youth Council discernment process followed. I said yes. I then spent two years serving the youth of our diocese with some incredible people. I learned a lot about being a leader, but I wasn't completely convinced I was one...yet.

I continued working TEC weekends, giving meditations, directing music, and being an assistant director. All of a sudden, I was being asked to lead an entire weekend. Then it began to sink in: I'm being called to lead. Directing led to being a part of our TEC Council, and then eventually led me to the TEC Conference Leadership Council and the core Leadership Team. It has been an incredible ride that I am humbled and honored to have been called to. I continue to say yes.

This has been a journey that has taken place over 15 years, and it has not always been easy. The biggest challenge I faced was saying yes even when I wanted to say no. I didn't do that alone. I have and continue to spend lots of time in prayer— discerning a call and deciding whether to say yes or not. I have had some of my best prayerful moments in discernment. It's a cornerstone of my decision-making.

Often times for me another real challenge to saying yes lies in whether or not I deem myself "worthy" of leading. I am human. I am flawed. I make bad choices. I don't live up to expectations and then I feel like maybe I shouldn't be a leader. The most important thing I have learned about leading is that leading is not about me. It's about what I can unlock in other people. That is what effective leadership looks like. I can be as flawed as anyone else so long as I help those around me to be a better version of their self.

So how do I do that? Pay attention. See what others bring to the table and AFFIRM them. Tell them that you appreciate what they have to offer and how valuable it is. This is a cornerstone of our TEC weekend. It is a part of recognizing the Holy Spirit working in others and helping others to hear their call. This whole concept is born from a very simple word that we use every day: love. To be leaders in our communities, all we have to do is to love. It's the example that God showed us by sending his Son. It's the example that Christ showed us by the way He lived and died for us. It's the leadership that God calls each of us to. We all can do it in our own way. All we have to do is say yes, and I believe that it's worth saying yes.
